- Honors is in the midst of a busy season of admissions recruitment, and Honors Ambassadors made themselves available the entire month of October during drop-in Zoom sessions and 1:1 conversations with prospective students.
- All incoming Honors students completed a common reading this summer, the book Factfulness: Ten Reasons We're Wrong About the World – and Why Things are Better Than You Think. We additionally hosted two Factfulness sessions on applied topics, the COVID-19 pandemic and climate change. We were excited to feature Honors alumnus Dr. Craig Ramseyer ('09), assistant professor of geography at Virginia Tech, as our guest presenter for the climate change program.
- The Toolbox Workshop series continues to offer our student the "soft skills" they need to succeed. Topics this semester have included: The College Classroom Experience, Balancing Transitions, Online Professionalism, Demystifying Graduate School, and Challenging Conversations. Toolbox Workshops are great opportunities for Honors to build campus connections, as well as to feature alumni presenters. **<u>GRACE LLOYD, NURSING</u>**: My Nursing Honors Capstone project is titled "Bridging Medical Services and Underserved Populations in Harrisonburg." As nurses, we are concerned with the healthcare patients receive both in and outside of the hospital. We recognized a deficit in education and resources for the population of Harrisonburg. We are partnering with The Gus Bus, a local literacy initiative, to reach out to the community and provide information to improve their health

literacy.

LAUREN ALEXANDER, PSYCHOLOGY: My Honors capstone project centers on a hypothesis that I have developed while working the in the Psychology Department's Social Relationships Lab with Dr. David Szwedo. In this lab, we examine data collected through part of the Kliff-Vida Project, an adolescence research group run by Dr. Joseph Allen at the University of Virginia. This is a longitudinal study of 184 adolescents and their peers that are tested on a variety of measures that help show how the relationships and interactions they have can predict their future behaviors. From this study, I have chosen to focus on adolescent peer pressure, specifically negative pressuring behaviors that lead teens to participate in substance use. Using the statistics program SAS to analyze the data, I am currently testing my hypotheses that parental and psychological control will act as predictors of adolescents' negative influence behaviors. I am now working in the lab to analyze the data and find significant conclusions so that I can create a fully developed Honors Thesis.

**HUY NGUYEN, ENGINEERING**: My Honors capstone project focuses on evaluating industrial hemp's potential for heavy metal phytoremediation. Phytoremediation is using plant-based technologies to clean up soils and groundwater that are contaminated, in this project's case, by heavy metals. To do this, the project is separated into three phases. The first is to design an environmental growth chamber so that I can grow the hemp samples indoors and adjust the environmental conditions (light, humidity, and temperature). The second phase is to cultivate the hemp samples in the growth chamber and intentionally contaminate the soils with various heavy metal solutions. The third phase is to harvest the samples and test them to see how much of and where the samples are located within the different parts of the plant.

"Priority enrollment was a huge perk for me and helped me graduate when I wanted to," shared recent alum Sophia Laila Cabana. "I almost always got into the classes I wanted to take, which made it easier to pursue a double-major and form meaningful relationships with my professors. It also took some of the stress out of enrollment season because I could go into my enrollment appointment feeling confident that I'd get into the classes I needed."

Each presenter will share their research in a brief presentation, and audience members will be able to participate in a Q&A.
