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BACK IN THE SWING OF THINGS - ALUMNI OPPORTUNITIES WITH STUDENT PROGRAMS

Getting back to three-dimensional campus life has been so rewarding this semester! While the Honors College has fully resumed in-person teaching and other activities, we are still offering a mix of virtual and in-person programming. Virtual events are most often organized as Zoom sessions that we share on Facebook Live to get a broader reach and maximize convenience. Virtual programs are wonderful opportunities for alumni volunteers to share their expertise and connect 1:1 with students. Below is a brief primer on student engagement activities this semester. - We are in the busy season of admissions recruitment, and Honors Ambassadors are making
 themselves available during drop-in Zoom sessions and 1:1 conversations with prospective students.

- The Madison Honors Leadership Council (MHLC) recently completed a successful fall recruitment, and are in the midst of planning programs for the rest of the semester, including social, professional development, and service events. - Diverse student programming continues to be a feature in the Honors College. We hosted a follow-up to last year's conversations about the book "Factfulness: Ten Reasons We're Wrong About the World and Why Things are Better Than You Think" this conversation about COVID-19 communication and data featured guest faculty presenters Cindy Klevickis (ISAT) and Michael Klein (WRTC). The Toolbox Workshop series continues to offer our student the "soft skills" they need to succeed. Major Mixers help students get connected with peers in their major areas. And a new series, Adulting 101, teaches students practical skills like financial literacy. Our Honors Book Club and writing peer group Work In Progress also continue to thrive.
- We were excited to take a group of students to James Madison's Montpelier in early October, and students in the Book Club are looking forward to a trip to the Edgar Allen Poe Museum in Richmond in early November.



JMU HONORS PERKS: ENRICHED CURRICULUM

With the recent alignment of credit hour and curriculum requirements between Track 1 and Track 2 students, all Honors Scholars are now working towards completing a Honors Interdisciplinary Studies minor that totals 25 credit hours, 19 credits of Honors Core coursework and 6 credits dedicated to the Honors Capstone Project. You will notice that research/experiential learning and diversity classes are now credit-bearing and part of honors curriculum requirements. This change in curriculum provides students a comprehensive academic experience in an integrated learning environment.

My Honors capstone project focuses on the representation of diversity in picture book characters. Since I am studying to be a teacher, this topic is important and relevant to my future profession because all students should see themselves reflected in the stories they read. I collected data for the research in Year 1 primary school classrooms in London. I am specifically looking at the identities of main characters and how they are portrayed in the texts!
